'The Seeker-Centered Church'

Seeker-centered isn't a good term for believers who belong to churches like **Christ's Bible Fellowship.** The phrase implies that a church bases its ministry style and programs on what appeals to all people seeking a happy, casual connection with some nice people and a God they can be comfortable with. Such churches purposely avoid being too overt about Christian symbols like the cross or any terminology such as *sin*, *sinners*, *lost souls*, *repentance*, *saved*, etc. that may offend non-Christians or mediocre believers who are seeking a comfortable religious environment to get near to God - but not too close!

A similar mitigated term is *seeker-sensitive* which isn't as non-committal about Christ, the cross, repentance and salvation as the *seeker-centered* church. These two *church growth* philosophies are very appealing and quite popular today with Christians *searching* for a totally positive, feelgood church that requires little to no personal life transformation nor sacrificial commitment to follow and serve Christ as Lord. Many of the mega-church ministries (2000 or more Sunday attenders) thrive using this *seeker style* approach of entertainment, theatrical performance services, and personal development programs. Although *seeker churches* do thrive numerically and financially, their philosophy is not found in Scripture.

Certainly good churches try be friendly and sensitive to those with weak faith or no faith at all in attendance, but nowhere in God's Word does He command catering to the weakest in the faith or those who have no faith at all, just to keep them coming and financing a spiritually weak ministry just to become enormous, prosperous, and famous. God's Word defines *seeker* entirely different than this *lame*, people-centered focus. Such churches are more *sinner-sensitive* than *Savior-sensitive*.

The *Seeker* we are to be *centered upon* and *sensitive to* isn't people at all. According to the Lord Jesus Christ in **John 4:23-24**, *God is the Seeker* of sincere, committed, faithful worshipers. He is to be the Audience of One Whom we worship, praise, sing, and study His Word each time we gather.

In seeker churches, people come to get something out of it for themselves; in a **Seeker church** God's people come to give something special to Him. True worship is making sure He got something out of our time in church. Did He get all of our loving praise and devotion, our money, service, ministry and fellowship to His people, and did we give the teaching of His holy Word our undivided attention and obedience?

Worship continues after the service in *Seeker churches* as humble, transformed disciples of Christ go forth to their jobs, schools, neighborhoods, and families *seeking* lost souls by sharing the gospel of Jesus with them between church services. Whenever we go out, we *seek and find* unbelievers and wayward Christians to bring with us next time we go to church. We bring a new believer to church to be with Him, *the Seeker of their souls*, for reverent devotion with other faithful disciples of Christ. In *Seeker churches*, they learn to be a true worshiper. That's what God is seeking. God is seeking your sincere worship – will He *get something out of you* today? If so, you'll get something out of it, too. *'You will find Him if you seek Him with all your heart'* today (*Deuteronomy 4:29*).
